Reading: 1 Kings 2: 10 - 12, 3: 3 - 14

Then David rested with his ancestors and was buried in the City of David. He had reigned forty years over Israel—seven years in Hebron and thirty-three in Jerusalem. So Solomon sat on the throne of his father David, and his rule was firmly established.

Solomon showed his love for the Lord by walking according to the instructions given him by his father David, except that he offered sacrifices and burned incense on the high places.

The king went to Gibeon to offer sacrifices, for that was the most important high place, and Solomon offered a thousand burnt offerings on that altar. At Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon during the night in a dream, and God said, "Ask for whatever you want me to give you."

Solomon answered, "You have shown great kindness to your servant, my father David, because he was faithful to you and righteous and upright in heart. You have continued this great kindness to him and have given him a son to sit on his throne this very day.

"Now, Lord my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David. But I am only a little child and do not know how to carry out my duties. Your servant is here among the people you have chosen, a great people, too numerous to count or number. So give your servant a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and wrong. For who is able to govern this great people of yours?"

The Lord was pleased that Solomon had asked for this. So God said to him, "Since you have asked for this and not for long life or wealth for yourself, nor have asked for the death of your enemies but for discernment in administering justice, I will do what you have asked. I will give you a wise and discerning heart, so that there will never have been anyone like you, nor will there ever be. Moreover, I will give you what you have not asked for—both wealth and honour—so that in your lifetime you will have no equal among kings. And if you walk in obedience to me and keep my decrees and commands as David your father did, I will give you a long life."

Reading: Ephesians 5: 15 - 20

Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. Therefore do not be foolish but understand what the Lord's will is. Do not get drunk on wine, which leads to debauchery. Instead, be filled with the Spirit, speaking to one another with psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit. Sing and make music from your heart to the Lord, always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats this bread will live forever. This bread is my flesh, which I will give for the life of the world."

Then the Jews began to argue sharply among themselves, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?"

Jesus said to them, "Very truly I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise them up at the last day. For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me and I live because of the Father, so the one who feeds on me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven. Your ancestors ate manna and died, but whoever feeds on this bread will live forever."

Well, what is Wisdom? The dictionary gives us a definition, "the quality of being wise as the quality of having experience, knowledge and good judgement "listen to his words of wisdom" based on sensible or wise thinking."

This morning we heard the reading from the Old Testament in the book of Kings where we find that King David has died and his young son Solomon is now king. The reading gives us an insight into the young Solomon who has just become king after the imminent death of his father David. God came to Solomon in a dream and offered him anything his heart desired. And Solomon told God he was just a little boy and requested wisdom so he could fulfil his duties to the many people he needed to lead.

God was so pleased with Solomon's request that He told the young boy he would also have health and wealth and a long life.

Our reading from Ephesians picks up the theme of wisdom too, with the words "look carefully then how you walk not as unwise but as wise making the best use of the time because the days are evil."

Difficult days in the Biblical times and difficult days in our time.

We are at last making some progress towards a more normal way of life after really difficult times which have touched every one of us in many ways. We have been urged to be wise and keep to the rules of social distancing, wearing masks, and not forgetting regular good hand washing.

In the first lockdown a Southampton policeman saw the behaviour of someone who had drunk alcohol in excess and totally forgot to do social distancing.

Within our communities when we come together, we can learn from each other and acquire the information we need to take care of ourselves and importantly to take care of each other. We will have acquired wisdom.

Turning to the Gospel reading from John we find echoes of the celebration of the Eucharist.

And there is nothing more meaningful than for us to gather together, to pray together and to share together the bread and the wine. A time to feel God's presence, a time to connect with our God and a time to connect with each other. Jesus tells us He is the bread of life.

We need to feed on His word, we need to drink in His life actions and his teachings in order to be wise in our understanding and our actions.

The current trend of electric cars is fascinating to me, can't believe we are going that way now, and it reminds us that eventually the vehicle will need to return to the power source to be recharged so it can be active again, just like we return to our power, the power of God to be fulfilled and to be able to act and be able to love again.

The Eucharist and God's word provides us with the time to plug into the Word and work of Jesus to recharge and to be able to fulfil our calling to love and care for each other as we are so loved by God.

To have wisdom is to know how to best care and support each other especially in difficult days and to thank our God for all His unconditional care and love. At this time we need to befriend people, we need to still support people, because we still have a long way to go but with God's help we will get there and we will support and love each other as we have been commanded to by God.
