We are going to hear this morning's scripture reading taken from 1 John chapter 4 verse 7 to 21. It all begins with God's love, and here in this reading 1 John makes it crystal clear – God is the source and definition of Love. God is Love.

In this reading we hear how this is love in action, not an abstract concept, made real when God sent his only Son to live amongst us and to die for us –

Reading: 1 John 4:7 - 21

Dear friends, let us love one another, because love comes from God. Whoever loves is a child of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. And God showed his love for us by sending his only Son into the world, so that we might have life through him. This is what love is: it is not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the means by which our sins are forgiven.

Dear friends, if this is how God loved us, then we should love one another. No one has ever seen God, but if we love one another, God lives in union with us, and his love is made perfect in us.

We are sure that we live in union with God and that he lives in union with us, because he has given us his Spirit. And we have seen and tell others

that the Father sent his Son to be the Saviour of the world. If we decide that Jesus is the Son of God, we live in union with God and God lives in union with us. And we ourselves know and believe the love which God has for us.

God is love, and those who live in love live in union with God and God lives in union with them. Love is made perfect in us in order that we may have courage on the Judgment Day; and we will have it because our life in this world is the same as Christ's. There is no fear in love; perfect love drives out all fear. So then, love has not been made perfect in anyone who is afraid, because fear has to do with punishment.

We love because God first loved us. If we say we love God, but hate others, we are liars. For we cannot love God, whom we have not seen, if we do not love others, whom we have seen. The command that Christ has given us is this: whoever loves God must love others too.

Thanks to Emma for our reading today, and to Clare for reading our hymns.

The words Emma has read to us talk to us of God's love. Of a passion expressed in Action, God's love surpassing anything we could ever understand as He sent

his only son to live and die for us. This love does not depend on our initiative or our worthiness, we don't even have to reach out to God, or even believe in God in order to be loved. He loved us even before He made us.

We don't need to clean up our acts before God can love us, or measure up to any predefined standard to be loved. We are immersed in God's love whether we deserve it or not.

In the passage, 1 John tells us that the more we know God, the more the immense reality of God's love dawns on us, when we open to the warmth of God's presence, we find even our deepest, darkest secrets, the ugly parts of ourselves we keep hidden are not beyond God. Nothing is so broken, so disgusting that God is unwilling to touch it. God takes us as we are completely, loves for who we are and works with us to make us whole and new.

There is much going on in this world today. We can see this passion expressed in action. We see communities coming together to help those shielding from Covid-19, shopping or ensuring conversations take place with those alone, people working tirelessly to create a vaccine, key workers ensuring food is distributed, refuse is cleared, transport is maintained for those how need it, medications being available, the sick being cared for, and those who grieve being comforted

Passion in action was illustrated for me, powerfully by the Black Lives Matter campaign, though campaign may not be quite the right word...

Watching the horrors suffered by others played out across the media, social media and in the lives of those around us. I have been part of many conversations In recent weeks trying to explain White Privilege, how unwittingly often we are part of institutionalised racism that adds to the way people are treated. I was out for a walk a couple of weeks ago, and overheard a lovely conversation between a teenage daughter and who I assume was her mum. The young lady tried to explain calmly how white privilege works for them, and against their black friends, how they may never understand the experiences of their friends, as they can never lived those lives, but that she would stand with them, and call out racism wherever she saw. Sat there, in the Old Man's Shelter in the middle of a bustling village green scene, the only voice I could hear was hers, her explanations in simple language with the examples she'd seen, and the deep concentration of her mother as she tried to understand how they could change things, left me in deep thought. The images across our screens, of murder played out in front of us, of grotesque beatings, of unjust stop and searches, of children still unable to eat in restaurants in America purely because of the colour of their skin, it is here where our passion must be in action. God's love is for all, and are all made in his image, and we must all ensure there where people are treated unjustly we stand.

People in Action also applies to us. How do we love ourselves for whom we are? God does, God loves you and he loves me, just as we are, flaws and all.

Two / three weeks ago, I found much of life difficult. I have the privilege of being able to work, but was working long hours, my children live in three different places, and though in constant contact on WhatsApp, it clearly isn't the same as seeing with your own eyes. When they struggle, it is difficult to ascertain the level of struggle with snapshots of messages. I became overwhelmed with the pressures of the day to day. I even spat out me dummy, so to speak, to poor Clare one Thursday evening – sorry Clare! Something had to give, and this course was it!

The following day I gave myself a break, it would be a day just for me. Now some of you, like me, have been knitting Angels for Revd Kate LeSeur at the MHA.

So this particular Friday, I settled down in my comfy spot on the sofa, turned on my box set of Downton Abbey, which I have been addicted to, and picked up my knitting needles. I had an odd ball of multi coloured wool, and this wasn't lost on me as I began to weave a new angel. This would be an angel of all colours, as in creation, we are all made in many shades. As my needles clinked I was aware that I wasn't fully concentrating on what I was doing, half watching Downton, half an eye on a knitting pattern, but pondering the issues of the previous few weeks. Somehow this angel wasn't quite right. It had a certain wonkiness about it. Try as I could it just wouldn't fit. But as each stitch unfolded, I became calmer, it would be right in the end. And it was. I worked out that I hadn't started with enough stitches, but I didn't go back and start again, I continued with what I had. Just as God does in each of our lives. Wherever our wonkiness, and wherever it lies, it is not reworked, or removed, it is part of us, of who we are, the very essence of why we are loved. God spoke very clearly to me that morning, each line of knitting, each clickerty click of needles, each mass of colour as the ball rolled across the floor, we are each good enough to work in God's plan, whatever or wherever that may be.

I finished my wonky angel, and I'm going to keep this one. It is a daily reminder of all the wonky angels that make up God's plan, that I am not perfect and that is absolutely fine with God.

God commands us to love one another as God has loved us, we therefore must accept the wonkiness in others. As 1 John tells us, if we love others (and ourselves) as God loves us, there are no boundaries. God's love was made visible in Jesus, and is the source of Love we share with others. When Go's unimaginable limitless love comes alive in us, we become the real presence of God in this world. We can stand with those who suffer injustice. We can love ourselves, we can be the wonky angel in all our glory!
