Good morning and a warm welcome to friends old and new to today's online worship from the Salford Methodist Circuit, where our theme will be spiritual growth. Let us begin with a few words from Psalm 92.

Bible Reading: Ezekiel 17: 22 - 23

"And the Sovereign Lord says: I will take a tender shoot from the top of a tall cedar, and I will plant it on the top of Israel's highest mountain.

It will become a noble cedar, sending forth its branches and producing seed. Birds of every sort will nest in it, finding shelter beneath its branches.

Bible Reading: Mark 4: 26 - 34

Jesus also said, "Here is another illustration of what the Kingdom of God is like: a farmer planted seeds in a field, and then he went on with his other activities. As the days went by, the seeds sprouted and grew without the farmer's help, because the earth produces crops on it's own. First a leaf blade pushes through, then the heads of wheat are formed, and finally the grain ripens. And as soon as the grain is ready, the farmer comes and harvests it with a sickle."

Jesus asked, "How can I describe the kingdom of God? What story should I use to illustrate it? It is like a tiny mustard seed. Though this is one of the smallest of seeds, it grows to become one of the largest of plants, with long branches where birds can come and find shelter."

He used many such stories and illustrations to teach the people as much as they were able to understand. In fact in his public teaching he taught only with parables, but afterwards when he was alone with his disciples, he explained the meaning to them.

Pardon for sin and a peace that endureth, thine own dear presence to cheer and to guide; strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow, blessings all mine, with ten thousand beside! Great is thy faithfulness...

Bible Reading: Ephesians 3: 14 - 21

For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name. I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fulness of God.

Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations forever and ever. Amen.

The theme of our service today was initially inspired by St Paul's prayer for spiritual empowerment that we've just heard especially verse 17 where it says, "and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in God's love".

The second part of this verse brought images of great, majestic trees, such as Giant Redwoods, Wellingtonias and Cedar of Lebanon, immediately to mind with their well-developed root systems which go deep into the soil getting the food and moisture they require to sustain their growth and give them strength. I'm sure we've all seen trees similar to these in gardens and arboretums. You may also have seen trees that have been uprooted and seen for yourself the roots which were once the means of getting nourishment to the rest of the tree.

The line made me think about and reflect on the growth of faith in God and growing spiritually both as individuals and as church communities and the more I considered it the other passages I've used this morning came to mind as well as part of the bigger picture if you like – we can only be rooted in God's love if the seed of his love for us and the seed of us loving him as our heavenly Father has been planted first.

Throughout the Bible, but especially in the New Testament there are many references to seeds and plants being sown and nurtured to help them grow. Both Jesus and St Paul use these images as illustrations of what the Kingdom of God are, how it will grow and what it will be like because the growing of crops and plants is something that their listeners are familiar with and can relate to and understand. It's something that's familiar to us too, even though we live in a built-up area, because many of you will be keen gardeners. Even those of us who aren't, and I include myself here, I'm sure we've all tried our hand at trying to grow something at some time in our lives, even if it's just trying to keep alive a plant we were given as a present.

When I was at primary school there was an annual schools plant show. We had the opportunity earlier in the year to buy small cuttings of various plants, I always seemed to end up with Spider Plants. We took them home and looked after for several months over the summer until September when the time of the school plant show took place. I managed to keep mine alive – to the point where they had "babies" but they never won anything at the shows. However, the experience did teach me how to look after plants of a certain type. But I have to admit here that our house plants at home have to thrive on neglect because they never get more than a weekly watering!

Signs of growth in our gardens bring hope for the future, in February and March we start to see the first signs of new life which we expect to develop into the spring. The bringing of hope for the future was God's intention in the verses we heard from Ezekiel. These verses follow Ezekiel's prophecy of judgement and offer the Israelites hope for the future if they put their trust in God. The reference to the tender sprig God said he would plant is a reference to the coming of the Messiah and the Cedar tree is a symbol for how big the Kingdom of God would be – encompassing all who believed in him, a prophecy that was fulfilled with the coming of Jesus.

Our own faith and love of God follows the growth pattern of a plant or tree. God's love for us and the beginnings of our love for and faith in him are planted in us, usually by our close family and friends when we are very small and they have small beginnings – just like the mustard seed we heard about. That seed of love and faith is then nurtured by them and others, our teachers at school and Sunday School and other people in our church family. As we get older and are able to read and understand the Bible for ourselves along with the help of ministers and fellow Christians, our love of God and our faith in him grows and deepens as time goes on until we feel that our roots are deep in the love of God as is Paul's hope for us in the passage from Ephesians. We then find that we are constantly being sustained and strengthened by the words of the bible which we hear in worship and read ourselves during our daily quiet time.

The same was true for the fledgling communities of new Christians and the beginnings of the Church in the first century AD. In 1 Corinthians chapter 3 verse 6 St Paul tells us that he was the one who sowed the seed of love for and faith in God in the new Christians, Apollos watered it and looked after it but they were working as servants of God, who was the one who made the tiny seed of love and faith grow. He goes on to say that this is still pertinent to us today – whenever we plant the seed of faith in either an individual person or a small group of people through our words or actions, we are working with God. We may plant the seed or do the nurturing but God will be the one who makes it grow and develop and we may not see the final outcome, someone else may witness that.

Think of your own faith journeys for a moment and maybe the faith journey of your church family – how did you come to faith, who and how many people, have influenced your love of God and your growth in faith? Who helped you to become more "rooted" in God's love? Throughout our whole lives we come across people who inspire us and influence our faith journey in some way even though we may not be aware of it at the time.

Let's just take a moment to think of those people now and give thanks for their lives and influence on us and our church family as we listen to this meditation by Ian Reid of the Iona Community.

Let us give thanks for those examples we know where God has given great growth from small beginnings in church and society. Let us pray that good life in church and society which appears to be small now may have big growth. "I will cut down the tall trees and make the small trees grow."

Let us give thanks for those examples we know where the small and powerless have been enabled to grow.

Let us pray for those whom we know in church and society who are small and powerless that they may grow.

"Birds of every kind will live there."

Let us give thanks for all the examples we know in church and society, where humans of every kind have found a welcome and shelter together.

Let us pray that wherever in church and society humans of diverse kinds do not find a welcome that they may do so.

"I, The Lord have spoken.
I will do what I have said I would do."

Let us rejoice and receive strength from this promise of God.

As I mentioned earlier our reading from Ephesians is one of Paul's many prayers for new Christians and fledgling churches in Ephesus and across the Mediterranean region during his years as a missionary and his time in prison. It's also a prayer for us too as we continue to live a life of faith in the 21st century.

Paul prays that they and we too, may know God's love for us and that we become rooted and grounded in that love, allowing Christ to dwell in us through faith. The more we become rooted in the love of God the more we grow spiritually and over time our faith in and love for God deepens. Paul wants us to know the fullness of God's love – its height, depth and breadth – God's love is bigger than we can imagine and encompasses the whole of creation. It's his love which sustains and strengthens us through our daily lives whatever situations we may find ourselves in as well as empowering us to do work in his name growing his kingdom here on earth.

How do we become firmly rooted in God's love I hear you ask? Through hearing and reading the Bible and meditating on the truths it contains, through regular prayer either individually or as part of a group of fellow Christians and by attending bible study groups where we can not only learn from the bible but through discussion with others.

Once we are "rooted and grounded" in God's love and our faith is on a firm foundation we can have the confidence to speak to others about our faith and tell them the good news of the gospel – planting that seed I mentioned earlier.

Since the gradual re-opening of the country in April, Frank & I have been having regular visits up to Martin Mere Wetlands Centre, passing through some of Lancashire's farming area on our journey – we've seen them being prepared for planting and now there are some green shoots beginning to appear although we don't always see anyone tending the crops. This reminded me of the first part of our reading from Mark's Gospel where we learn that whilst the farmer sows the seeds the earth produces the crops without the farmer's help - he just needs to harvest the crop when it's ripe. The growing of all things, whether it's crops, creatures or faith is God's handiwork he may use some of us to plant seeds of crops or faith, others to water those seeds and yet others to harvest the final crop as we heard earlier but ultimately the work is God's - part of his plan to grow his Kingdom here on earth. We are just part of his plan to expand the Kingdom of God in the 21st century and as churches are slowly beginning to re-open we will start to grow back together as church and a circuit community in readiness to start planting new seeds of faith and hope, gently nurturing those whose faith may have been seeded during the last 15 months whilst we have been kept apart, and some of us, may even witness the harvest but we can't do his work unless we ourselves are "rooted and grounded in God's love".

As we re-emerge from our long period of enforced isolation it's my prayer that in the weeks and months to come that as both individuals and church communities we root ourselves in God's love and thus strengthened we have the courage to step out of our comfort zones and plant and nurture the seeds of faith in others giving them encouragement and space to become "rooted and grounded" in God's love and have Jesus dwelling in their hearts. Let us plant and nurture and

let God do the growing as he has done down the millennia from the time of St Paul to us here today in the 21^{st} century. Amen.

Loving and living God, we rejoice that you are involved in our world, and involved in our lives, not distant or remote, but seeking the good of everything you have made. Gratefully we put our trust in you. In mercy, hear us: in love, respond.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord.
