Let's pray:

The new developments across the country and the world over the past 12 months have sent us all into chaos. From one week to the next we are 'trying' to be community. We are 'trying' to be church. We are 'trying' to be 'normal'. But each day something else develops that needs our careful thought and care to ensure that we are all looking after one another as well as ourselves.

The word developments, means the process in which someone or something grows or changes and becomes more advanced.

Some developments are really welcomed and some are not.

I have been on a wee bit of a rollercoaster, to say the least, with the possibilities and the probabilities of re-opening some of the churches I am pastorally responsible for. Of course, this is not something we, as ministers, decide on our own. We are in communication with our congregations as well as our colleagues, the Circuit, the District and Connexion. Of course, sometimes there are areas that decisions in the best interest of and out of a duty of care that we do have to make that others may not understand, even after thorough explanations. We like to be in control of what happens within our lives and support our loved ones whatever we and they are living through.

Initially I think that everyone could understand that the new virus that had been discovered meant that we had no choice but to "Stay at home", "Wash your hands", "Stay at a safe distance". We needed to "Stay Alert", "Control the Virus", "Save lives", and more recently we are reminded that we need to "Stay home", "Protect the NHS", "Save lives". We are asked to continue to wash our hands, wear our face coverings and keep a distance. All very sensible things to do and to follow during a pandemic of the scale we are in just now.

Our church families have been absolutely brilliant since Day 1. Month after month have passed and still people have been very patient.

But... when some of the restrictions were gradually released, we could feel that sense of relief. We were able to meet in our gardens, on the doorsteps, in outdoor spaces. Soon we were able to go out to a café or a restaurant, keeping a distance of course!

We even began to make moves towards making some of our churches, "Covid Secure". Some church buildings had necessary repairs done, roofs, boilers, toilets needed essential work to be done, all of those were done in a safe environment.

All the time we have been waiting to hear the "Good News", different good news that we expect to hear under the normal church conditions. Now we are looking for the good news that the virus is finally under control. We do get asked, "when will we be able to re-open our church buildings?" Some people are ready to return, whilst others are a little bit tentative and others are simply not ready at all to reopen and to re-attend.

The development of the vaccine has been a positive thing for us all. It has and will continue to give us the hope that we need.

I have had a stubborn flu virus that began on the 16th of December and then disappeared only to return again on the 1st of January. I contribute to the Covid-19 App each day and had to report my symptoms and was asked to have the Covid test twice which I did, one at a drive-in centre and one in a walk-in centre. Both tests came back negative I am glad to say and relieved to say. The waiting was horrible. I was thinking through who I had been in contact with, during the time I thought I was over the flu I had taken a funeral, following all of the safety rules and guidelines, of course. We didn't see anyone on Christmas Day but on Christmas Eve instead we saw two of our sons and their families. So I was preparing to have to tell people if I had 'the virus' for them to isolate. I had been shopping again taking all the precautions, of course. I felt guilty even although I hadn't done anything wrong and stayed within the guidelines.

We can't control how other people behave though and often whilst shopping I have walked past someone on more than one occasion who didn't have a mask on and coughed as they passed me, not covering their mouth or their noses, just coughing quite naturally as if, you know, it didn't matter. It is now the third week after the new year and I am getting to a place of feeling quite normal again, with some day not feeling not quite normal, but these will pass, these days will pass. We all want 'normal' again don't we? We don't want any more new developments. We want to just get on with things like they used to be.

We are no different to the people of Jesus' day. In the Gospel of Mark, Mark presents Jesus' preaching and the manifestation of the kingdom of God as a decisive new development in the history of Israel. But I must emphasise that Jesus wasn't promoting the people a new religion. He was taking the people into a decisive new development that would enable the people to progress their lives as well as bring them to the point of recognising the kingdom of God. Bringing them to the point where they could see God ruling over all people. Of course, we then need to think about being in God's kingdom and what is right for God's kingdom and what is wrong for God's kingdom. We want God's kingdom to be a good place for us all to live in. This, I am sure, is what the people of Jesus' day would have wanted just as we today want too. We need to be able to be given guidance on how to make better people of ourselves if we are to live together in God's kingdom.

For it to work for the best for all human kind, we cannot do this alone, we need to make it work together. We need to work with God. If we do not then we cannot help but go off at different tangents from everyone else. We may even believe that we can save the world and make that an individual self-destructive mission as well as bringing others down with us. When we are all scattered all over the place then there are bound to be differences, we live in a world of different cultures – so did Jesus. We live in a world of different communities – so did Jesus. It is natural for us to become part of a community where we are but this doesn't mean that we can't work with different communities and be in relationship with each other for the bettering of the world we live in. We say

that we want a better world but who do we want a better world for? We say that we would like to open our church buildings again, I agree with this, but I also think about the dilemmas that we will face by doing this. I'm not speaking about the practicalities of making it a 'safe space' to invite our church families back in to – I believe that we will have to look at the risk assessments again with help we will be able to do this, it shouldn't be a problem. The thing that I am concerned about is that we will simply go back and 'pick up where we left off'. God sent Jesus into the world to make a difference to a world that had gone wrong. Jesus came as God had planned not to introduce a new religion but to develop the already existing religion into something that would change people's attitudes to not only the way they worshipped which had gone array, he would give people the opportunity to come and follow him and be prepared to make changes that were for the good of not only themselves and their families but for everyone.

The kingdom of God was being introduced to the people in a new way and a lot of people would have dug their heals in, and a lot of people wouldn't have wanted to change, a lot of people would do their utmost to persuade others that this new way of thinking and doing just hasn't got any chance of 'succeeding'. But others did take that chance, they took the chance. Others came on board with Jonah and with Jesus. Where do we as the church begin to prepare ourselves for the natural changes that will have happened since we last met. I don't think that we can 'pick up where we left off'. We need to be prepared for the changes and the new developments that have happened and need to happen when we are able to re-open. Not only to the physicalities of our buildings but to us as individuals and as church. We can't go back into our church buildings and have a quick catch up with the last 12 months. Too much has happened. Our Spiritual lives may have become stronger over the past year but for some the experiences of the past year has taken the toll with what we have experienced and are experiencing today. Because we are church, doesn't separate us from the rest of the community. If we think that it the church is separate from the community, then we are in serious trouble. People outside of our church families, as well as members of our church families in the area of Salford have been being creative and thinking 'outside of the box' so to speak. Now is the time for us to take hold of the opportunities that have opened and are opening up to us to think 'outside of the box' or should I say 'outside of our buildings' and get our heads together as a Circuit to bring anything at all, no matter how 'out of the norm' you may feel it is, I'm telling you it may seem a crazy idea but God came up with the crazy idea to send Jesus to us so that we could make a difference in the kingdom of God. Jonah took the risk to obey God and do as He asked of him, the people heard and changed their ways. Jesus knew what He had to do to make a difference. He called the disciples one by one, and one by one they took that step out of their box, the lives that they had known forever had changed. They didn't know why they had to but they took that risk. I don't believe that God wants for us to enter into and stay behind the four walls of the church building. Now is the time to take hold of not a new religion but to take the opportunity to develop our church in new ways, to take that step out of the

four walls that will eventually allow God to stand back and say "It is good" once more.

In the meantime, as you take your daily walk, staying at a safe distance, with your masks on whilst shopping, washing and sanitising your hands, stay safe, stay well and Stay Alert and obedient and even be surprised at what God is saying to you. But don't just sit on it, have conversation, pray about it, tell me, tell Clare or Matt.

We can make a difference, but we need to take that step out of the four walls of our church buildings and be within the community and invite the community to be with us too.
