It is a Psalm of David.

In you, O LORD, I seek refuge; do not let me ever be put to shame; in your righteousness deliver me. Incline your ear to me; rescue me speedily. Be a rock of refuge for me, a strong fortress to save me.

You are indeed my rock and my fortress; for your name's sake lead me and guide me, take me out of the net that is hidden for me, for you are my refuge.

Into your hand I commit my spirit; you have redeemed me, O LORD, faithful God.

My times are in your hand; deliver me from the hand of my enemies and persecutors. Let your face shine upon your servant; save me in your steadfast love.

Amen and thanks be to God for that word.

We will say together the Benedictus together, The Song of Zechariah. I'll say the words in light print if you could please follow with the words in bold print.

Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, Who has come to his people and set them free.

The Lord has raised up for us a mighty Saviour, Born in the house of his servant David.

Through the holy Prophets, God promised of old To save us from our enemies, From the hands of all who hate us, To show mercy to our forebears, And to remember his holy covenant.

This was the oath God swore to our father Abraham: To set us free from the hands of our enemies, Free to worship him without fear, Holy and righteous before him, All the days of our life.

And you child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High, For you will go before the Lord to prepare his way, To give his people knowledge of salvation By the forgiveness of their sins.

In tender compassion of our God the dawn from heaven shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, And to the Holy Spirit: As it was in the beginning, is now, And shall be for ever. Amen.

May our giving of time, prayer and finance once again be given humbly and generously and received by the people who need them most.

We pray for the Church throughout the world. Some people may feel that because their building is closed that they may never be able to meet again. But we know Lord that our churches will be able to open its doors in the future it may take some time, we are still church outside of the four walls as well as inside. Returning will happen when the time is right and when it is safe to do so. Let us thank you Lord for this time to be able to think about what being church really means. Are we the people of God? Or are we the people of the church, the building, being identified only as that? Lord I hope and pray that we continue to join together for Worship in many different ways and that our church grows wherever it may happen and that new seeds continue to be planted at home, within the community as we strive to grow into the church of 2020 and beyond. We pray that with boldness and gentleness we remould into the shape that you want us to be and not as we expect it to be. We pray for all generations who long to be back with their church fellowship to have trust and confidence in themselves and in their faith that holds us together.

We pray that all those who are affected by any illness be given the

opportunity to seek refuge in you until they feel strong enough to enter back into the world. We pray for those who find themselves in any sort of trouble may they be given the opportunity to seek you – you who came into this world to help us and care for us even in times of trouble. We pray for those who are in distress, lead them to a safe and calm place where they will in time, with love and support, be able to see the sunshine after the rain.
