

Is God Among Us Or Not - 27th September 2020 Rev Kim Ratcliffe

Good morning and welcome to worship.

Reading: Psalm 78:1-4&12-16

Give ear, O my people, to my teaching; incline your ears to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth in a parable; I will utter dark sayings from of old, things that we have heard and known, that our ancestors have told us. We will not hide them from their children; we will tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the Lord, and his might, and the wonders that he has done

In the sight of their ancestors he worked marvels in the land of Egypt, in the fields of Zoan. He divided the sea and let them pass through it, and made the waters stand like a heap. In the daytime he led them with a cloud, and all night long with a fiery light. He split rocks open in the wilderness, and gave them drink abundantly as from the deep. He made streams come out of the rock, and caused waters to flow down like rivers. Amen

If we think date wise we have no date of when creation happened, we have no date for when Noah built the ark. Paper and pen, well papyrus and ink, we think, was around 2500BC and libraries wouldn't have been filled with the billions of books that now fill the world's libraries. I can become quite nostalgic when I pick up an old book - I love old books, one that you know there have been many people who have delved into the words written on each page. The smell is something else that I love and the colours of the pages too. I like to look at the inside of the cover and see if there is any evidence of who the book belonged to, the date in which it was written; even if I don't actually buy the book and bring it home I can somehow engage with the book if only for a moment thinking about the writing of it, the script being handed over to someone or sent to the person who gives it the go ahead to be printed in the end. The book starts off with an idea or a piece of information that the writer wants to develop and share with anyone who may have an interest in it or want to hear what the writer has to say.

Moses was ascribed to have been the author of the first five books of the Bible. The Pentateuch. It is thought to have been written approximately between 1406/7 and 1450 BC, the final part of Deuteronomy which covers the death of Moses was thought to be written by Joshua.

We are now in 2020 so I make it that we are reading our Old Testament passage that we will hear in a moment approximately 3,020 years after Moses probably wrote it. At the very beginning of creation people wanted to do their own thing, go their own way. God's instructions have been disobeyed since time began by humankind who thrive to be in charge, have complete control of what they do with disregard to what even God wanted and knew would be best for them. We have struggled with authority since day one but we need to remember that God is with us today as He was with Moses He really is! We will, first of all, hear the first piece of scripture now; it is taken from the Book of Exodus Chapter 17 verses 1 to 7, and as I said it is taken from the NRSV version of the Bible. Then we will join Clare and our singers as we sing 'Moses I know you're the man'.

Reading: Exodus 17:1-7

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the Lord commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarrelled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the Lord?" But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" So Moses cried out to the Lord, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." The Lord said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. He called the place Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarrelled and tested the Lord, saying, "Is the Lord among us or not?"

Is the Lord among us or not?

We are used to listening to and even, obeying or not obeying the words of those in authority. But what is authority nowadays? Do we listen to people who stand on the street corners, people stood at the front of large audiences, do we listen to the people leading business meetings, church meetings, speaking from the pulpit or the lectern, talking to us and with us and sharing with us what perhaps we should or shouldn't be doing or just simply sharing information with us? Maybe not shouting out about it but speaking, talking to us. Do we listen, or do we laugh and huff and puff and walk on and do our own thing? Do we listen to those who have been invited to take on leadership roles in businesses, in politics, communities and even our churches? What and who do we listen to today? I can understand why there is a resistance to taking on leadership roles, even in a church situation. People like in Moses' times don't hold back sometimes from what they have on their minds and it comes out through their mouths, and sadly this can be the same in any environment. Times have changed over centuries but there is still the need for us to abide by rules that have been made, rules that often come from people in leadership and because of that they are given the responsibility to pass the information on. Today, like in Moses' time we are still being told and guided how we should be working and even behaving through guidelines that are given to us. When things don't go quite to plan, then who is to blame then? Is it the powers that be or is it the middle management or is it people who are trying to implement the guidance from the top? Today we do live in a culture of blame and sometimes we don't even know that we are being blamed for something until we are faced with what seems to someone with a huge problem; but then when we are talking through that situation, the realisation is that things can be resolved with a little bit of patience and understanding.

Imagine being in the wilderness of the situation that not only the Israelites were being led through but the wilderness that Moses was leading them through with minimum tools to hand apart from the knowledge that God was with him. This

wasn't the first time that Moses had faced the unrest of God's people. The people thought that Moses had "taken us away to die in the wilderness? What have you done bringing us out of Egypt? In Exodus chapter 14 verse 11, this is a few verses before that which I've read. "Moses stretched out his hand over the sea. The Lord drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night and turned the sea into dry land". Then again further down the line there was another state of uncertainty and the need to challenge Moses once more. But that was ages ago. wasn't it? We don't have anything like that here today!

I'm going to turn from Moses for a wee while and look to Jesus in Matthew, it's always good to look to Jesus, whether in Matthew or any of the books of the Bible. Now Jesus - Jesus I see as my friend. I can talk with Jesus. Jesus in our Matthew reading went to church, well the Temple, a place where he used to being challenged by the teachers, remember Jesus as a 12-year-old boy in the Temple? Just as the chief priests and the elders challenged Jesus, he certainly was unafraid to challenge them too. So, as they asked him "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" He was able to pose just one question to them. "Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?" When you think about this, Jesus was in their temple, the temple that was theirs -well God's they had claimed it though - and it was the temple that they had authority in. Who did this man think that he was, cheek of him! Teaching the people the chief priests should have been? They should be listening to them, not someone who hasn't officially been given their authority. Or had he? He had of course, at his Baptism in Matthew Chapter 3 we see Jesus, he was anointed by God with God's Spirit and "a voice from heaven said. "This is my Son." People, including the tax collectors and prostitutes, will have seen this happen, at that moment of Jesus' Baptism from John, it was affirmed that Jesus was indeed the Messiah. If the Chief Priests and Elders said that they believed they would have had to follow Jesus the Messiah but they wouldn't back down, they were stubborn and enjoyed the position that they held. It takes a lot to admit that you were wrong, doesn't it? If only they had the mind to sit down calmly with Jesus and to discuss with Jesus, maybe as individuals they may have come to see the light but they didn't and that's sad. The two sons in Matthew were asked to go and do a task for their Father. One went straight ahead, jumped up, agreed to do the job and then failed to fulfil his promise. The other son was reluctant to do the work of his father but after a while he realised his mistake and just got on with the job. Moses was given a task to do for God. If we don't react to something that God has asked of us, then we are in danger of not doing anything at all. We need to be consistent in how we respond to God and that does mean trusting that God is with us, not only with us as individuals but among us. US - you and me - as we go about our everyday lives as they are today. We have got such a lot to look forward to in the months ahead. I can understand with all of the uncertainty we have been going through for a long time now that we have become a little bit disheartened and a wee bit confused or a lot confused about what we are and what we aren't able to do. And I said recently "can someone please let me know what the recent

guidelines are" not because I don't check, I do, but it can change from day to day and week to week and I like to get things right.

We may feel that we have been doing all the right things, facing the challenges that we have had to endure. The first verse of Exodus today we heard, "From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the Lord commanded." Moses was their leader and they looked to Moses to blame for the hardships that they faced on their journey. It brought their leader to the point that he cried out to God himself because he had run out of things to say to them. God heard the anguish that Moses was in. He hears our anguish, and we need to believe that. I need to believe that. The Lord answered Moses, "Walk on ahead of the people. Take with you some of the elders of Israel and take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. I will stand there before you by the rock of Horeb. Strike the rock, the water will come out of it for the people to drink." Are you in a place that you feel you want to argue with God and that you are testing God? "Is the Lord among us or not?" are you saying? We need to continue to support one another during the different stages that this difficult journey has been taking us on. We have walked difficult paths in the past and we will continue to walk with God before us until we come to a point where the best thing in our lives is KNOWING that the best of all God is indeed with us, God IS with us. Thank you, God, for being with us here today and remaining with us always. Amen and thanks be to God.
